What is an apostrophe?

An apostrophe is a punctuation mark used to form possessives or contractions.

Apostrophes and possessive nouns

The rules about forming possessive nouns probably vary depending on what type of noun you make into a possessive. Here are the rules:

For most singular nouns, add apostrophe+s:

- The clown's balloon
- The king's candy
- The man's eyes

For most plural nouns, add only an apostrophe:

- Example: The cats' food (multiple cats)
- Example: The birds' nest (multiple birds)
- Example: The planets' rings (multiple planets)

For plural nouns that do not end in s, add apostrophe+s:

- Example: The children's toys
- Example: The geese's migration route

Style guides vary in their recommendations of what to do when you have a singular proper noun that ends in s. Some recommend adding only an apostrophe:

Example: Sirius' moods are outrageous.

• Example: Marcus' work ethic is outstanding.

Others say to add apostrophe+s:

• Example: Sirius's moods are outrageous.

• Example: Marcus's work ethic is outstanding.

Use whichever style matches the style guide you use for your writing. If you don't have a style guide, it's OK to pick one of the methods, as long as you don't switch back and forth within the same document.

Contractions

What's a contraction?

A contraction is a shortened form of a word (or group of words) that omits certain letters or sounds. In most contractions, an apostrophe represents the missing letters.

CONTRACTION	UNCONTRACTED	EXAMPLES
-n't	not	isn't (is not), won't (will not)
're	are	you're (you are), they're (they are)
'd	had, would	she'd (she had, would), I'd (I had, would)
'	will	we'll (we will), you'll (you will)

- They are = they're
- Cannot = can't
- Could not= couldn't
- You will = you'll

Note: Contractions are perfectly standard, but they're usually considered to be relatively casual. If you're writing something very formal, you may want to avoid using them
